Opening Plenary - Pete Duncan

A welcoming session that includes an orientation, key information about the programme, and introductions to some of the people shaping the conference.

We'll kick things off with dynamic opening debates on a variety of topics—an opportunity for everyone to share perspectives, connect informally, and help shape a collective understanding of the key issues at the intersection of circus and education. You'll also hear from special guests as they share insights into their work, philosophies, and what they're bringing to the event.

Intro to HUPR - Dr. Dean Kriellaars

Dr. Dean Kriellaars is joining us from Ecole Nationale de Cirque Montreal. As Scientific Director, Dean will be presenting an outline of the programme of HUPR- Research Centre for Human Potential based in the school.

The Power of Networks - Taina Kopra, President of Caravan, Lorenzo Albiero, International Project Manager for FEDEC, Lynn Carroll, President of EYCO and Lucy Medlycott, Director of ISACS

It's rare to get three of the four major European networks in one room, but EYCO, Caravan and FEDEC have all come along to NICE! They will be joined by the Irish Street Arts, Circus and Spectacle Network (ISACS). Taina, Lorenzo, Lynn and Lucy will discuss their work and place in the European circus landscape, and the role networks play for their members.

RIGGERS & Every Knot Matters - Lorenzo Albiero, FEDEC

RIGGERS (React, Invent, Get together for a Goal: Expertise in Rigging Services) has been developed to address the needs of riggers in professional circus schools, with the aim of improving the quality of safety measures and creating an international community willing to exchange skills, advice and know-how to pass on to future generations. Lorenzo Albiero presents the results of this programme, and will explain the transition towards FEDEC's new project – Every Knot Matters – in which EYCO is a partner.

FRIDAY 16.05.2025 09:00 - 17:30

Constructing Quality Movement Experiences using Physical Literacy

- Dr. Dean Kriellaars

This workshop will provide the foundation for creating quality movement experiences for holistic development of participants in which movement is used to develop physical, psychological, social and creative abilities. The workshop will provide practical examples and experiences to foster positive movement experiences by constructing positive challenges for all participants independent of level of ability. Participants will learn the physical literacy-based principles for intentional coupling of competence and confidence, audience progressions, preventing social inhibition, maximizing connectedness, fostering agency and creative potential.

The Activist Clown - Robyn Hambrook

Do you want to change the world? Would you like to explore the potential of clowning and circus to be political and tackle serious issues? Join Robyn Hambrook for experiments in mischief and resistance in this practical and playful workshop exploring the subversive power of the CLOWN. We will explore the playful, transformative and political mechanisms of the clown through games, flow and improvisation. All levels of experience welcome.

The clown is a powerful tool for resistance. Their power derives in part from the unique place they occupy – a liminal space, on the fringes, a commentator, a rebel, a soothsayer, able to resist social conventions and hold a mirror up to society's absurd mechanisms. Come and explore the clown's regenerative and empowering potential.

SATURDAY 17.05.2025 09:00 - 18:00

Social & Contemporary Circus in Challenging Living Conditions

Rose Abou Elias and Cathrina Ighnatious from Cirquenciel (Lebanon), Noor Abo Alrob from The Palestinian Circus School, and Mohammed Shafie from Nablus Circus School (Palestine)

Amid war, displacement, and occupation, circus becomes a language of hope. Rose, Cathrina, Noor and Mohammed share powerful stories from their work. Cirquenciel reflects on Lebanon's deep crises—from economic collapse and pandemic to the devastation of the 2023–2024 war—showing how circus instructors stepped up as frontline psychosocial supporters for displaced communities. From Palestine, speakers reveal how circus builds resilience, resistance, and connection in the face of occupation, especially since the escalation of violence in October 2023. Through the lens of Nablus, one of Palestine's most challenging environments, they spotlight the everyday courage of artists and youth. This session weaves testimony, video, and lived experience into a moving portrait of circus as survival.

Confidence by Design - Dr. Dean Kriellaars

As part of the durability design concept, this session will describe the key components of establishing a confidence culture. This session will describe the benefits of intentional linkage of confidence & competence. These benefits include enhanced performance, reduced risk of injury, faster and fuller return from injury and continued participation. Participants will learn about the various types of confidence sources (coaches, directors, team members, therapists, etc) and how individuals value these sources. Participants in the workshop will co-create approaches to eliminate confidence erosion practices, as well as to foster intentional confidence building activities.

The Impact of Social Media - Dr. Jayne Rodgers

For many people, being online brings benefits and challenges. For young people, these can feel amplified. Chances to connect, to learn, to create are intrinsic to digital technologies. This session will explore what we can do to harness the good, while helping young people to stay safe online. The session will focus on social media use, particularly on the impact of influencers, online bullying and the negative and positive aspects of marketing to young people. The session will explore how we can help young people feel confident online and how circus practitioners can reach them in exciting, interesting ways.

SATURDAY 17.05.2025 09:00 - 18:00

Moving to Performance - Pete Duncan

An interactive workshop exploring the barriers to performing and how to mitigate them, then experiencing and exchanging activities in three areas: improvisation and being comfortable on stage; starting from a skills base and being creative; ways of presenting skills in different formats.

The session will conclude with looking at adapting activities and transferability. This workshop will have physical activities/experience.

Open Space Technology - Lynn Carroll and Pete Duncan

Open Space Technology (OST) is a methodology of running large group meetings or events around a central topic where participants create the agenda themselves. The process is designed to be highly participatory, inclusive and collaborative.

Open Space Principles:

- Whoever comes are the right people
- Whatever happens is the only thing that could have
- Whenever is starts is the right time
- When it's over, it's over.

Also, one law:

• The law of two feet

What burning topics do you think need discussing? Bring your ideas along and put them into Open Space.

Managing Risk in Circus - Dr. Dean Kriellaars

This workshop will provide a new framework for the analysis of any circus activity. The concepts of surplus safety (safe as possible) and adequate safety (safe as necessary) will be discussed. This will be the foundation for understanding "safety creep" - the unwanted creation of surplus safety.

Examples will include traumatic injuries in circus, chest binding practices and the setup of standards for safety in public schools running circus arts instruction in physical education. This neutral risk framework is beneficial for insurance, liability, creating safety guidelines, and implementation of circus activities in novel settings.

Failing Better - Davi Hora and Dr. Ian Walsh

Dr. Ian Walsh and Galway Community Circus trainer Davi Hora present an interactive session on a collaborative project between University of Galway and Galway Community Circus.

Heartbeat is a workshop which promotes an aesthetic experience where participants can explore elements of juggling and its intersections with expressive dance and physical theater. The workshop is part of the module Failing better, building resilience through circus arts, delivered at University of Galway. No juggling experience necessary.

SUNDAY 18.05.2025 09:00 - 17:00

Circus in Schools in UK & Germany - Soren Neilsen, Teo Greenstreet, Maeve Keane, Peter Duncan and Wolfgang Pruisken

The Circus in Schools circle is a working sub-group under Circusworks. We are 4 practitioners who are all working in schools using Circus as a tool to engage children and young people in learning. We meet once a month to discuss ways and strategies for introducing more circus to more schools; writing up advocacy documents, exchanging promo material and ways of 'selling' circus to schools and discussing ways of collecting impact data for use for funding applications, to mention a few of our work tasks. We all share the strong belief that Circus is an incredibly valuable artform which engages children and young people from all backgrounds in learning whilst greatly increasing confidence, trust and social skills. In this talk we would like to present examples of what we each do with, in, at and around schools, how we 'sell' circus to schools and how circus can enhance the school curriculum.

The Rise of Right Wing Politics and its Impact on Community Spaces - Cameron Keighron

Collaborative session facilitated by Cameron Keighron. Cameron (they/them) is a community educator, advocate, and Director of AMACH! LGBT Galway, a community development organisation dedicated to creating inclusive spaces for the LGBT+ community in Galway City and County. They also serve on the board of Galway Community Circus. With a background in science, health advocacy, and grassroots activism, Cameron brings a unique lens to conversations about power, belonging, and community care.

Circus Arts Instruction in and at School - Canada - Dr. Dean Kriellaars

This session will describe the factors that were critical for the integration of circus arts instruction (CAI) in physical education (PE) in public schools, and the integration of performing arts into the formal physical education curriculum. This session will describe two Canadian jurisdictions where CAI was implemented for students from kindergarten to grade 8. Differences will be highlighted between CAI in PE, social circus at school and youth circus clubs at school will be discussed. Issues discussed will include standard equipment kits, equipment costs, installation of fixed rigged aerials, safety standards, and teacher training. Barriers to implementations in other justifications will also be discussed.

SUNDAY 18.05.2025 09:00 - 17:00

Youth Accreditation - Katja Tuuli & Becca Clayton

Katja Tuuli from Sorin Sirkus & Becca Clayton from Galway Community Circus present a workshop in Erasmus + youth accreditation. This is the funding that has made this event possible. Learn how to apply and host future NICE events, youth exchanges and more!

Fostering Inclusive Movement Environments - Dr. Dean Kriellaars

This session will describe a successful program, termed SENSE-ational schools for inclusion of participants with different sensory and physical abilities in various movement contexts. This session will highlight differences between "inclusive" and "adapted" approaches. The foundation of this program utilized "the circus way" as well as physical literacy as guiding principles. This session will also highlight specialized equipment and the design of spaces for inclusion.

The Onion and the Car Park - Pete Duncan

This workshop is about exploring ideas for training, capacity building and mentoring. Theories drawn from Learner Centred Learning and Playwork will be used to look at:

- Frames for exploring what students need and what can be offered
- Designing courses with levels of challenge, expectation, knowledge
- Creating learner agreements

Case studies will be offered on the design of courses and individual placements. The session will conclude with looking at adapting thinking and transferability. The workshop is focussed on thinking and discussing.

Concluding Penary - Pete Duncan

The final session of the conference will look at reflection and evaluation. A fast paced workshop looking at why we evaluate – for individuals, for organisations and funders. A range of evaluation activities will be offered together with examples of their use. There will be an evaluation of the event designed and run live.

SPEAKERS



Dr. Dean Kriellaars

Dr. Dean Kriellaars is a world-renowned expert in physical literacy, durability, and the performing arts. A neuroscientist and exercise physiologist, he is a global leader in movement science and a passionate advocate for inclusive, high-quality physical activity. Dr. Kriellaars serves as Associate Dean of Research at the College of Rehabilitation Sciences, University of Manitoba, and as Scientific Director at the Center for Circus Arts Research at École Nationale de Cirque in Montreal. His pioneering work with Cirque du Soleil focuses on performance enhancement, injury prevention, and resilience in high-performance circus environments. He developed the PLAY assessment tools and co-created Passport for Life for PHE Canada. Dean's Human Performance Laboratory supports cutting-edge research in motor skills, gender equity, and risky play. Widely recognized for his innovation and community leadership, Dr. Kriellaars continues to shape physical education and health policy, championing the idea that learning to move is as essential as literacy or numeracy.



Dr. Jayne Rodgers

Dr Jayne Rodgers is an academic and digital practitioner with over 20 years' experience in the digital ecosystem, including as a Lead Trainer on the Google Digital Garage project. Her research strengths include psychological explorations of social media use and influencer impact, with particular expertise in consumer behaviour online. Her most recent research projects include an investigation into young people's responses to TikTok marketing, the limitations of online public health messaging for diverse demographics and the challenges facing advertising bans in a digital context.

Pete Duncan

As a Director of CircusWorks, the UK youth circus network and cofounder of Circus Eruption, Pete is a dedicated force in the UK circus education scene. As a freelance trainer with Co-Train, he delivers mentoring, training, and capacity-building support both online and in person, collaborating on a diverse range of creative and educational projects.

A familiar face at CircusWorks festivals, conferences, and Un-Conferences, he actively contributes to the growth and innovation of the youth circus community. His involvement spans across Europe, including leading roles in masterclasses and initiatives like the "Learner Centred Learning" project, which champions more inclusive and responsive teaching approaches.

In the UK, he brings expertise to local communities through partnerships with organisations such as the Circus House in Manchester, and the University of the Third Age—proving that circus is for everyone, at every age.



Robyn Hambrook

Robyn is a Bristol-based director, performer, and teacher with over 20 years' experience in clowning, physical theatre, circus, and street arts. Holding an MA in Circus Directing and a Diploma in Physical Theatre Practice, she has trained with renowned practitioners such as Holly Stoppit, Giovanni Fusetti, and Philippe Gaulier. Her recent focus explores the intersection of clowning and activism, particularly through her Master's research, Small Circus Acts of Resistance, and work with the Bristol Rebel Clowns and Trickster Laboratory. Robyn has collaborated internationally with Jay Jordan, Clown Me In, LM Bogad, Hilary Ramsden, and The Yes Men. In 2020, she co-founded The Online Clown Academy, delivering digital clown training during the pandemic. Her exploration into activist clowning includes Bouffon training and politically charged workshops like the Nomadic Rebel Clown Academy and the Clown Congress. Robyn continues to innovate through collaborative spaces that merge performance and political engagement.

Taina Kopra

Taina Kopra, founder and artistic director of Sorin Sirkus, has supervised and been responsible of the pedagogic work for 40 years at Sorin Sirkus. She has been not only a circus teacher and artistic director but a visionary, who has developed and made path for Finnish youth and social circus education. She has received several awards and acknowledgements from youth work, artistic work and performances and significant work for circus in Tampere and whole Finland.

With Sorin Sirkus as one of the co-founders of Caravan back in 2008, she played since then a crucial role with network and its Board. Taina is a president of Caravan.



Noor Abo Alrob

Noor Abo Alrob is a circus director, artist and trainer. He joined the Palestinian Circus in 2008. Since then, he was involved in different projects related to contemporary circus, social circus, alternative education, arts management, and many others around the world. Currently he is the artistic officer at the Palestinian Circus. Noor has completed his BA in administrative and economic sciences, and his MA in Arts and culture management.

Lynn Carroll is CEO of Galway Community Circus, Director of CircusWorks and President of EYCO – the European Youth Circus Organisation. Throughout her career she has performed globally as a multi-disciplined circus artist with some of the most pioneering and acclaimed contemporary circus companies of the time, as well as being at the forefront of developing the UK youth circus sector for nearly 40 years.

Søren Nielsen is the co-founder and co-director of Scarabeus Aerial Theatre, a circus company who is one of the pioneers in the UK of site-specific aerial performances in unusual places. Scarabeus has also been a pioneer in using aerial skills as a social circus tool in primary schools. For over 30 years they have worked with children, young people and families in London and England using aerial skills to build confidence, trust, social skills and a sense of place; offering high quality arts projects with a deep impact to people and communities, who would not normally have access to such experiences. They do extensive fundraising to be able to offer activities free of charge to schools and communities. One of our most successful projects, Flying into Physics, uses aerial art to teach science to children in an experiential and kinaesthetic way aligning directly with the science curriculum thereby engaging children in learning in a non-academic way.

With master's degrees in International Relations and Human Resources, Lorenzo has experience facilitating international youth projects and developing educational initiatives under Erasmus+ & Creative Europe programmes.
